Women are often expected to look after the children and in political roles such as being an MP this can be tricky as they would have to split their time between parliament & Westminster which limits the number of women willing to stand as an MP. For example the MP Kirsty Blackman once had to bring her 2 and 5 year old children to her place of work due to parliament and school holidays clashing.

Having only 1 parent working dramatically decreases a households income & having to travel long distances to visit family members in prison can be expensive. For example HMP Gartree is in a very rural location making it difficult & expensive for family members to visit
13	one reason alternatives to prison are effective is being they are less expensive. Keeping someone in prison is very expensive as they have to be fed, clothed & have accommodation. This costs the tax payers a great deal of money which could be better spent on healthcare or education so alternatives <sup>n</sup> cheaper

13	<p>punishments such as electronic tagging are better as the criminal can still feed, clothe and provide accommodation for themselves whilst <sup>by</sup> working &amp; earning money, whilst still serving their punishment. For example it costs £35,000 a year to keep someone in prison but only £5,000 to electronically tag a criminal.</p>	
13	<p>Alternatives to prison are also an effective punishment as they reduce overcrowding. Overcrowding is a serious issue which stretches prison resources, limits the number of people able to take part in rehabilitation education programmes &amp; leads to tension between prisoners &amp; officers. So alternatives such as a community pay back order are effective as the prisoners can be punished for their crimes whilst also giving back to the community &amp; reducing prison population. For example every year in Scotland 8,200 community pay back orders are issued instead of prison sentences which <del>allows</del> limits the number of prisoners in &amp; allows them better access to rehabilitation.</p>

Universal credit is money which the government pay to people who are Disability or are ill or who are unemployed with the hopes of supporting them and incase of people who are unemployed supporting till they get back in to a job. People on Universal Credit get paid differently. People who are disabled get paid more than people who are unemployed and are able to work people who have a household of 2 get paid less than people who have a household of 4. This shows that the government are trying to support families in poverty.</p>	
<p>q9</p> <p>One consequence of social and economic inequalities on families is poor education. This is because if you are struggling financially you are unable to purchase stuff which will help their children succeed in education e.g. textbooks or people in poverty cant hire a tutor to help your child. This also can have negative affect in the future for child. for example if you have poor education your money likey to be in poverty with roughly 44% who have no qualification are in poverty compared to roughly 25% of people who have below a university degree in poverty and roughly 15% who have a university degree are in poverty showing that poor education can lead to poverty.</p>	
<p>Another consequence of Social and Economic inequalties on families is poor health. This because due to not having the money to purchase healthier food Children are more likely to experience health problems. For example children in poverty are twice as like to become obese than children not in poverty showing that poverty can lead to poor health.</p>
