Would it be Moral to legalise Euthanasia?

In this essay I am answering the question 'would it be moral to legalise euthanasia?'. Euthanasia is ending someone's life to stop suffering, and is most commonly used for terminal patients with few exceptions. Euthanasia means 'good death' in Greek. This is important to the question as it ponders whether it is moral for euthanasia to be legal. Morality is whether is immoral (wrong) or moral (right). For example it would be immoral to steal from a charity, but moral to give to charity. Simplified my question is asking whether it is right to make it legal to end someone's life, upon their request. In my essay I will be exploring the views of ~~over~~ some Muslims and the Hospice movement who are against euthanasia and some Christians and Dignitas: dignity in dying who are for euthanasia. This is a relevant issue because of the Sanctity of life. The sanctity of ~~these~~ life is the idea that life is sacred and so therefore should be protected - this is not only a religious view. ~~But~~ And depending how you interpret that you may be against - because it is ending someone's life - or for it - because it stops someone suffering. This question is also important and relevant because it is on the cutting edge of ~~the~~ medicine and many new ideas on it are being displayed all around the world.

These are the laws around the world on euthanasia and are important as they give us an idea on what in general these countries think on the morality of Euthanasia. In the United Kingdom passive euthanasia (turning off life support) is legal, however active euthanasia is illegal. In the Netherlands active euthanasia is legal and even

children can be euthanised. I don't believe children should be offered the option of euthanasia, as although they understand the pain they are going through, they may not get understand the sanctity of their own life. In some American States (such as Oregon ~~and~~) active euthanasia is legal but they have strict guidelines: the patient must be suffering from a terminal illness, have ~~at most~~ only 6 months to live, and be in the right state of mind. I agree with the USA's strict guidelines, however what if a doctor says a patient only has 6 months to live, when in reality they have 2 years. If a doctor miscalculates a patient's suspected death (which is an easy mistake to make) that may force a patient to end their life earlier, which ~~could be~~ forcing faster goodbyes with loved ones. Some places around the world where euthanasia is legal are Luxembourg, Belgium and Switzerland (~~the only countries where foreign~~ ~~is~~). Some examples of countries where ~~not~~ active euthanasia is illegal are Saudi Arabia, India, and Australia (except for the state Victoria).

The question is asking if it is moral for euthanasia to be legal, but there is more than one type of euthanasia, so we need to know if all types of euthanasia are ~~leg~~ moral. Active euthanasia is when actions are actively taken to end someone's life, such as giving them a dosage of drugs that you know will end their life. Passive euthanasia is when actions aren't taken to end someone's life but they are stopped being kept alive, for example turning off life support, withdrawing treatment, water or nutrients. Voluntary euthanasia is when someone wants and ~~asks~~ to be euthanised. Non-voluntary euthanasia is when someone

is euthanased but has not requested, but someone has (i.e. family member, loved one) on their behalf because they can't e.g. a baby or coma patient is unable to request euthanasia but someone else (i.e. parents) may consent to their life support being withdrawn. Involuntary euthanasia is when someone doesn't ask to be euthanased, but is anyway, this is widely ~~regarded~~ ~~regarded~~ regarded as murder and a horrific example is when Hitler euthanased disabled babies without their or their parents consent in Nazi Germany. Involuntary euthanasia I believe will always be immoral and should not be legalised. ~~Doctors sign~~

Some Muslims believe that suicide in all forms is wrong. Muslims see life as a test so to end your life is to cheat that test is wrong. The Qur'an also says that "When their times comes they cannot delay it for a single hour nor can they bring it forward by a single hour." (Qur'an 16:61) ~~The Muslims~~ believe the Qur'an is the word of Allah so follow it very closely, so would believe euthanasia is wrong. The Hospice movement/care not killing believe euthanasia is wrong also. The hospice movement believes that we should care for people not kill them. Because palliative (end of life) care is so good, Euthanasia is not necessary. Palliative care is very good and can give a painless end.

of life however if you are suffering from a degenerative disease such as (MND or ~~Alzheimer's~~ Alzheimer's) ~~perhaps~~ a hospice may not be the right place for you. Your end of life will be painless, but probably confusing and scary, and you may not wish for your loved ones to see you in that state or may feel like a emotional or financial 'burden' on them. The hospice movement also disagrees ~~to~~ with euthanasia as they believe it puts pressure on people to end their lives so they are not a burden. The hospice believe it would be immoral to legalise euthanasia.

Some Christians believe euthanasia is acceptable. Christians are taught to "Love thy neighbour" (Matthew 22:39). This means they should help people and if someone wants to be euthanised, then they should be allowed to be euthanised. "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." (Luke 6:31) that means treating people how they want i.e. if they want to be euthanised allow them to be euthanised. However for Christians (who follow the bible) it is hard to form an opinion on euthanasia as the Bible, unlike the Qur'an is not completely explicit on whether euthanasia or assisted suicide is right or wrong. The bible is also quite contradictory, and forbids ~~not~~ killing people/murder ~~or depending on the Christian's opinion~~ so euthanasia could also be interpreted as wrong. Some Christians would believe ~~ethan~~ it would be moral to legalise euthanasia.

Dignitas: dignity in dying thinks euthanasia is moral. They believe people shouldn't suffer and should be allowed to choose how and when they die. Dignitas,

'Dignitas: dignity in dying' also believe euthanasia should be legal as it would help and stop a lot of people breaking the ~~law~~ law. 44% of people would break the law and help a loved one die risking 14 years in prison (dignityindying.org.uk). If euthanasia was legalised loved ones trying to help patients have control of their death wouldn't go to prison for helping someone. Protecting not only the patient but their loved one. They also believe it would be more supportive for terminal patients if euthanasia was legal. 300 dying people take their own life every year (dignityindying.org.uk). This means if the law was changed many people could end their life in comfort surrounded by friends instead of alone and scared. Some muslims believe it would be immoral to legalise euthanasia because ending your life is cheating the test of life, and even if you are in pain, suffering is part of the test.
